No gerrymandering affects the election of representatives direct democracy as opposed to representative democracy involves individuals voting for themselves not through representatives. That would give america a house of around 660 representatives which would be a manageable size the new house would be far from perfect but it would be more representative of the country than the current gerrymandered system.

But in 2012 california democrats won 62 percent of the house vote and got 72 percent of the seats so some have argued that the state just ended up gerrymandered anyway
